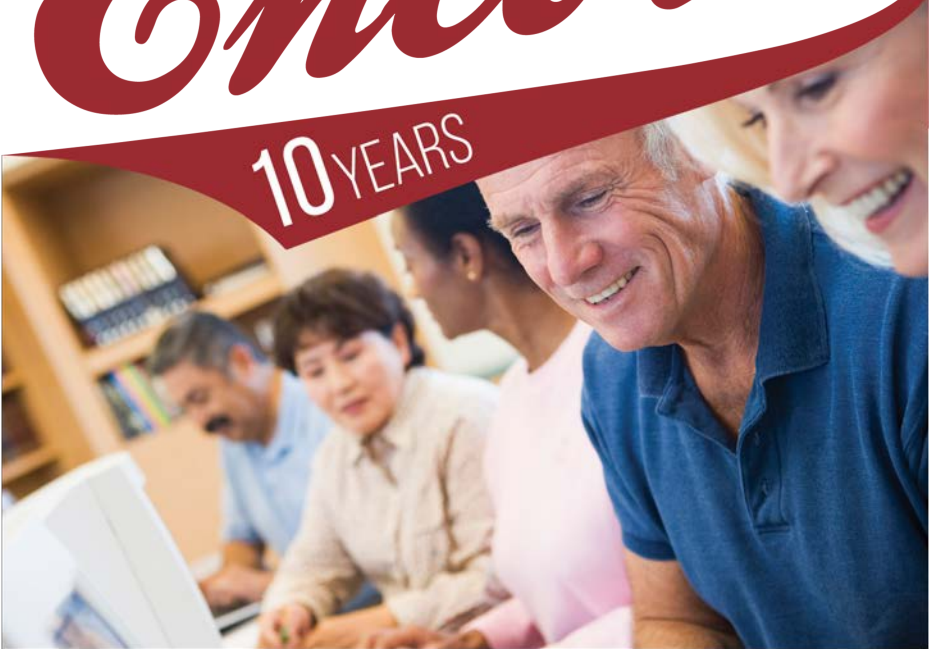

ENCOR 020-01: PBS: The Grantchester Mysteries Pt. II

This course will continue exploring the James Runcie novels shown on PBS. The reading will come from Runcie's "Sidney Chambers and The Problem of Evil" (Book 3) and "Sidney Chambers and The Forgiveness of Sins" (Book 4). (Reading books one and two is not necessary, but viewing Seasons One and Two from the video series might help one get familiar with the characters and time period, although the episodes differ slightly from the novels).
