UNIVERSITY MISSION STATEMENT:

CATALOG DESCRIPTION: In this internship the student will carry out an intensive field experience in an area of discipleship ministry. A naturally expected component of this will be a focus in small group ministry broadly defined. At total of 150 hours of work in a local church, or another Christian education situation approved by the discipline coordinator is required. Prerequisites: CHMN150, CHMN220, CHMN230, DISM301 and DISM302.

I. PURPOSE STATEMENT

The internship focuses on enabling men and women to prepare for ministry as a professional career. It serves as an opportunity for the student to learn competencies for functioning on a church staff as an educator and leader. The church setting will provide an arena to practice the theory learned in the classroom, in a field setting and to assist the student to discover his/her professional strengths and weaknesses.

II. OBJECTIVES OF THE COURSE

A. General Instructional Objectives This course seeks to:

- 1. Help the student develop his/her spiritual, emotional, social, and intellectual life in relation to ministry.
- 2. Explore and participate in as large variety of experiences of education ministry of a local church as possible.
- 3. Observe and practice methodology which will carry out operationally the practical skills of training and leadership in small group ministry.
- 4. Afford opportunity for observation of a professional practitioner

- engaged in full-time vocational ministry in a church context.
- 5. Help the student in the integration of the various approaches of discipleship & small group ministry with practice in a local setting.
- 6. Help the student develop his/her ability to relate to lay persons, and the professional staff in ministry settings.

B. Specific Behavioral Objectives

As a result of the activities and study in this course, the student should be able to do the following:

- 1. Articulate in writing a balanced understanding of being a full-time vocational minister.
- 2. Organize (or critique) a basic structure of small group ministry.
- 3. Appraise the work of a professional ministry staff person in the area of this internship.
- 4. Evaluates the overall effectiveness of a specific small group ministry.
- 5. Compare and contrast the various approaches to small group ministry.
- 6. Construct a plan for effectively leading a small group.

- 1. Church Educational Philosophy
- 2. Educational structures of:
 - a. Sunday School Programs
 - b. Small Group Programs
- 3. Biblical Foundations of Small Group Ministry
- 4. Theological Foundations of Small Group Ministry
- 5. Strategies of Small Group Ministries
- 6. Small Group Ministry and other church ministries (e.g., Media, Music)
- 7. Constructing new small group ministries
- 8. Evaluating existing small group ministries

IV. INSTRUCTIONAL PROCEDURES

The nature of this course is field work. Therefore, no formal means of instruction will be used.

V. COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

- A. Completion of 100% of the specific behavioral objectives.
- B. Completion of at least 150 hours in the church setting.
- C. Completion of mid-term and final self-evaluation reports.
- D. Completion of mid-term and final evaluation reports by supervisor
- E. Weekly meetings with the local church supervisor and with the professor.

F. Assigned readings and class attendance.

- C. Evaluations from church supervisors and the professor: no point value.
